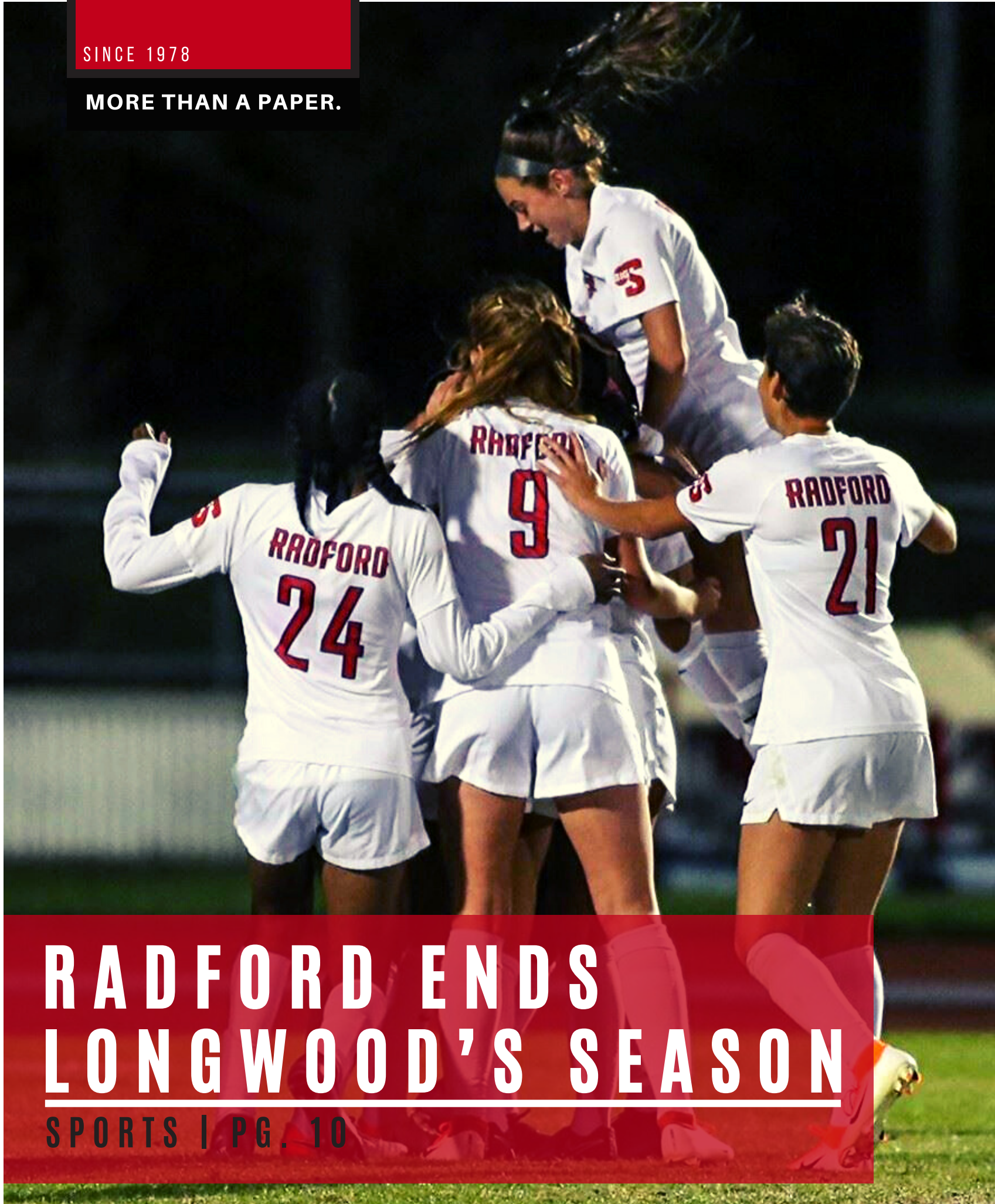

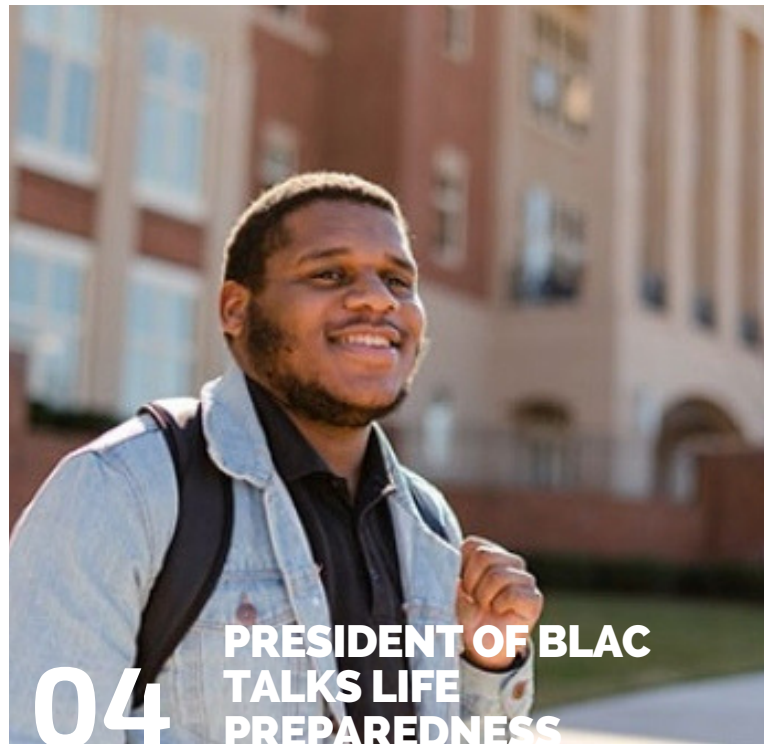

# University Unveils BB&T Leadership Program

Radford University announced on Oct. 28 that they have partnered with BB&T to create a Leadership Development Program for Radford students.

The program will involve seminars, lectures, and community forums. It will also include the BB&T Leadership Institute in Greensboro, NC.

Up to 30 students will be selected to join the program, and each will receive an “emerging leaders” certification upon completion.

This new partnership is one of several that BB&T has made with colleges and universities in the US. According to the BB&T Leadership Institute’s website, students that complete the program will “be equipped with practical tools and strategies for overcoming leadership shortcomings discovered during the sessions.”

This is not the first partnership Radford has made with BB&T. For more than a decade, the BB&T Charitable

Foundation has helped the Davis College of Business and Economics fund bringing expert speakers to Radford.

According to Radford’s website, President Brian Hemphill said this new Leadership Development Program is a “significant step forward” in their relationship with BB&T.

“Without question, BB&T is making a difference at Radford University, especially in the lives of our students,” he said.

Dr. Danylle Kunkel, associate professor of management in the Davis College, is leading the new program.

said. “Having the partnership with BB&T acknowledges the importance of building a community of students and leaders, who can share their ideas of ethical and social leadership.”

Kunkel has spent nine years

teaching and researching social entrepreneurship and leadership development at Radford.

Dr. Joy Bhadury, Dean of the Davis College, thinks Kunkel is “highly deserving” of the position because of her research into leadership and

ethics stating “This is further reflected in all aspects of her academic career, including her unique approach to teaching social entrepreneurship, which undergirds these two pillars of the program.”

## President of BLAC Talks Life Preparedness

Beon Case, President of Black Leaders Attaining Careers (BLAC), spoke with The Tartan about his career plans and how BLAC intends to help Radford students with life preparedness.

As a junior, Case is a student representative for Radford University’s Board of Visitors, a Brother of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity Inc, and a former residential assistant.

He is a Business major and a member of the Honors College on campus. During his education, Case has found himself able to establish professional relationships within President Hemphill’s cabinet, the department of student affairs, and other student minority organizations on campus.

Case says he created BLAC because no other organization at Radford fit him.

“I’m a part of the Honors College here on campus. There aren’t many people within the college who look like me,”

he said. “BLAC gave me the opportunity to value education and surround myself with people who look like me so that all of us can become the leaders that we are destined to be.”

Case believes that the university is “making great strides” towards diversity and inclusion, and intends for BLAC to help prepare students for life’s challenges.

“The overall goal of BLAC is life preparedness,” Case explained. “BLAC helps all students for life after graduation. When you leave college, you should at least know how to get a job, write a resume, communicate professionally, budget efficiently, and so much more.”

Case had a rough upbringing in Norfolk, VA, as the oldest of five siblings in a single-parent household. He described his experience in the inner city of Norfolk as “not the best.”

Case said, “Just like most inner cities, Norfolk faces the challenges of drugs, gang affiliations, and extreme levels of poverty.

“My family did their best on keeping my siblings and I out of trouble.”

After graduating from Radford, Case has his eyes set on an entry-level consulting position at Accenture, a successful consulting firm. He eventually plans to move to either Northern Virginia or Atlanta, Georgia.

Housed in the Writing Center, any student can use The Cupboard, no questions asked. Faculty from the Sociology, English and Women's and Gender Studies departments all help with donations.

Dr. Michele Ren of both the English and Women's and Gender Studies departments and Justine Jackson of the English department co-created this food pantry.

Dr. Ren was inspired on Twitter by a graduate student at Washington State University who tweeted about the pantry she set up for students on the WSU campus.

Jackson described The Cupboard as "a grassroots, community-based project that any department or organization could support in numerous ways." Jackson said she picked the location because so many

students come through the Writing Center.

Non-perishable, "dorm room" foods are available, such as Easy Mac cups, ramen noodles, granola bars, oatmeal cups, crackers and soups. Donations are welcome, and Dr. Ren has set up a "Wishlist" on Amazon. Students can donate at the Writing Center or the English Department.

"If you're hungry, and near CHBS, please come grab something," Dr. Ren said. "This is primarily for students with food insecurities, but we will feed all students, no questions asked. Don't go all day without eating something, stop by and grab a snack or something more substantial."

Jackson hopes that "whether donating or setting up a similar pantry in their space, we all could work together to help alleviate food insecurity on campus."

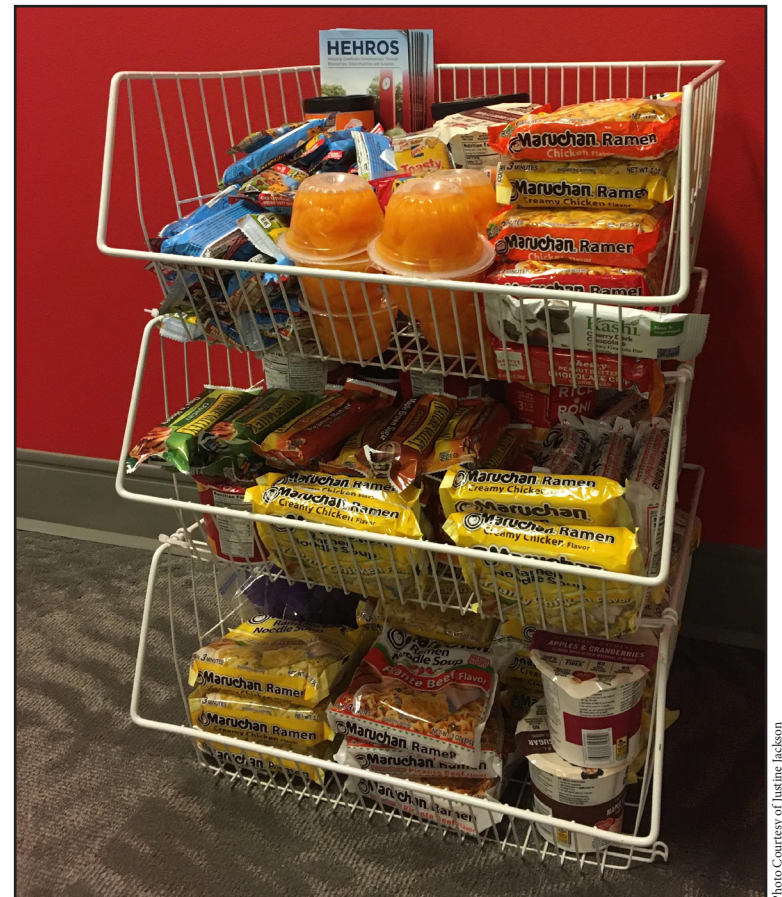
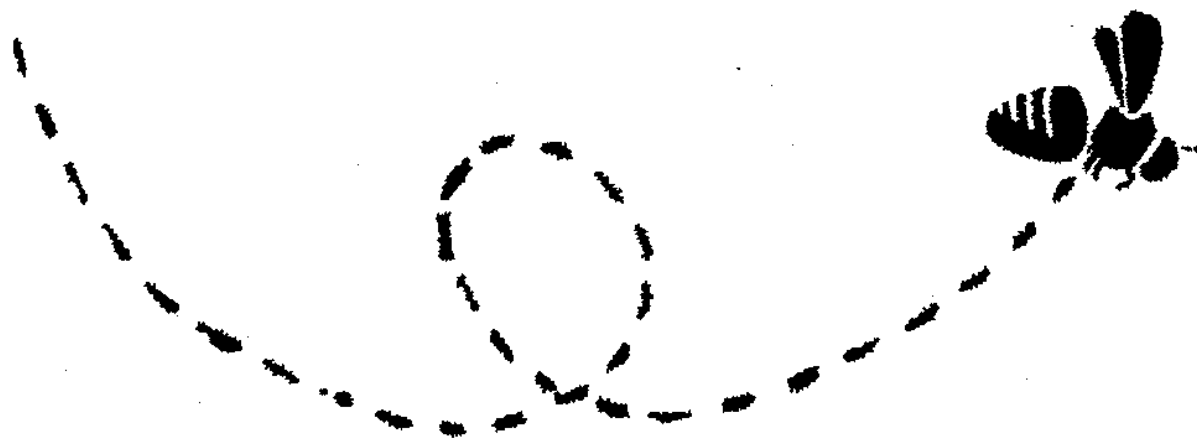

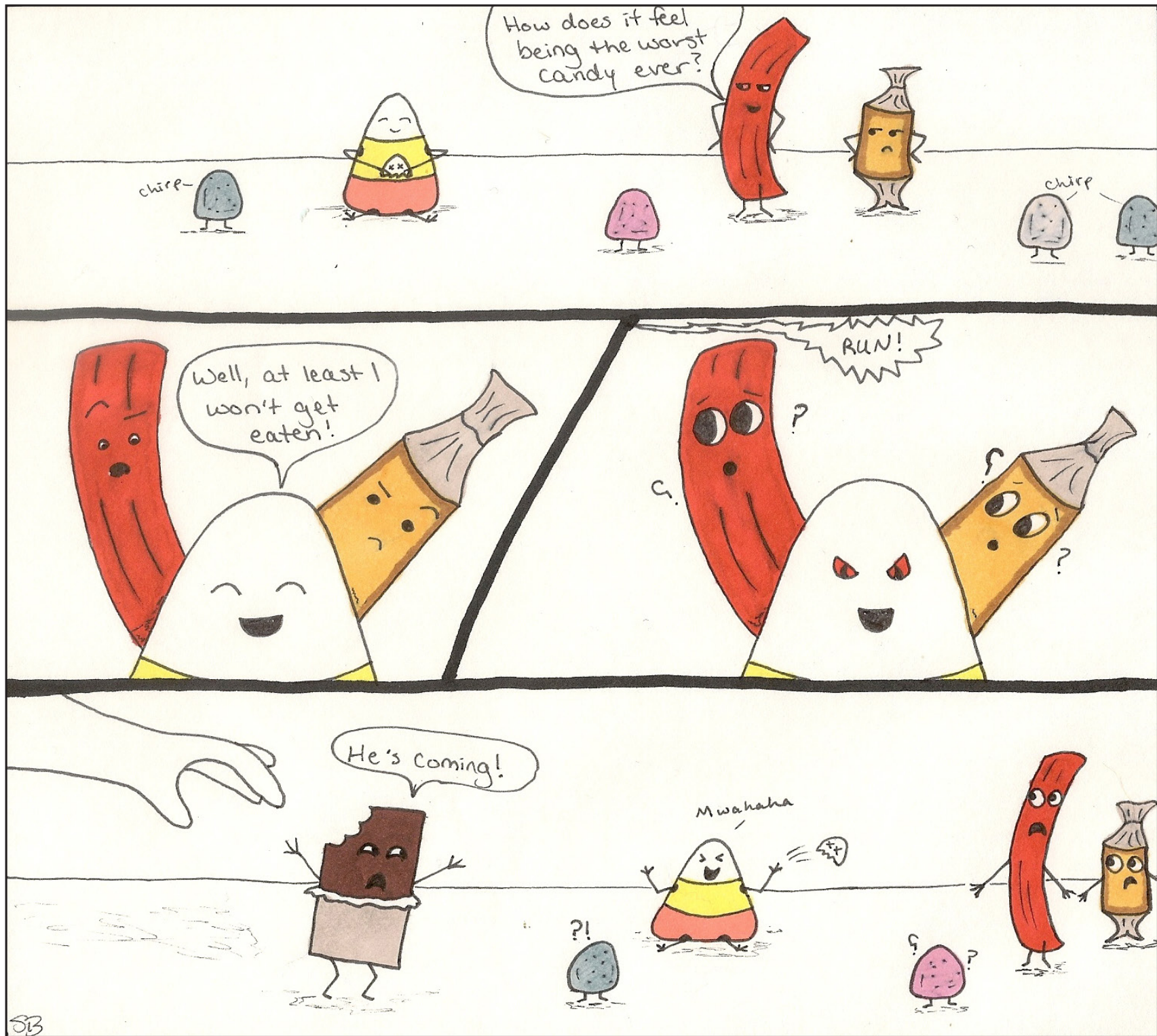

# The Growth of the Main Street Restaurants

It's common knowledge that one of the riskiest business investments that a person could take is to open a restaurant.

The variables that one must consider for opening a restaurant are diverse; the investor must analyze the location, how much a consumer will spend on a product, and bringing something new to the table to grab the attention of local customers. But with all things considered, we have brave entrepreneurs looking through these variables to give consumers what they want.

As of the publishing of this article, three businesses have now begun their presence on the Main Street of the city of Radford. This economic growth is hugely welcomed; they're filling out the city's once-vacant lots.

These new businesses include a Mexican restaurant, Mamas Kitchen, which is an American BBQ restaurant; and Roma Pizza. These restaurants have taken the opportunity to dip their toe in the growing economic market of Radford.

I would say that this opportunity still holds a risk for these businesses either due to the overestimation of demand, lacking enough of a workforce to maintain growth, or just being unable to compete with already pre-existing businesses.

Pushing aside any pessimistic opinions, I believe that these businesses know how to cater to the diverse population of students and residents. The food they are selling doesn't take the risk of giving something away too unusual and appeals to Radford students' distinct tastes.

I got the chance to experience one of the opening businesses, Roma Pizza, located a bit farther down from Highlander Pizza. I sat down with one of the co-owners and asked him about his perspective of being a new restaurant owner in the current economic market.

The owner had once run a previous pizzeria in Radford around 2005, while also co-running another establishment in Blacksburg. But, due to a disagreement and some trust issues with his prior co-owner, the original business closed.

But now he has returned, working in the same building as before. His return also stems from Radford's economy increasing. He wanted to set up the business during that growth.

“I've heard rumors from other locals that certain pizza establishments have made the food more in-line with fast food quality,” the owner said. One would value this passion for improving the quality of a menu that is heavily commercialized, but I wanted to see if his words aligned with his actions.

I was not disappointed. Roma's food erupted in my mouth with such a dynamic flavor, and it's wonderfully crafted food as well, for those wanting to try a familiar food with a unique taste.

My experience at Roma Pizza has given me quite an optimistic feeling for the other upcoming businesses on Main Street and increased my willingness to spend my time and capital at these new establishments.

Hopefully, these new businesses will succeed and inspire other entrepreneurs to open up ventures in the ever-changing city of Radford, which currently seems to cater to its growing student population.

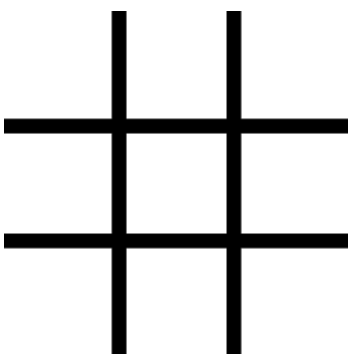

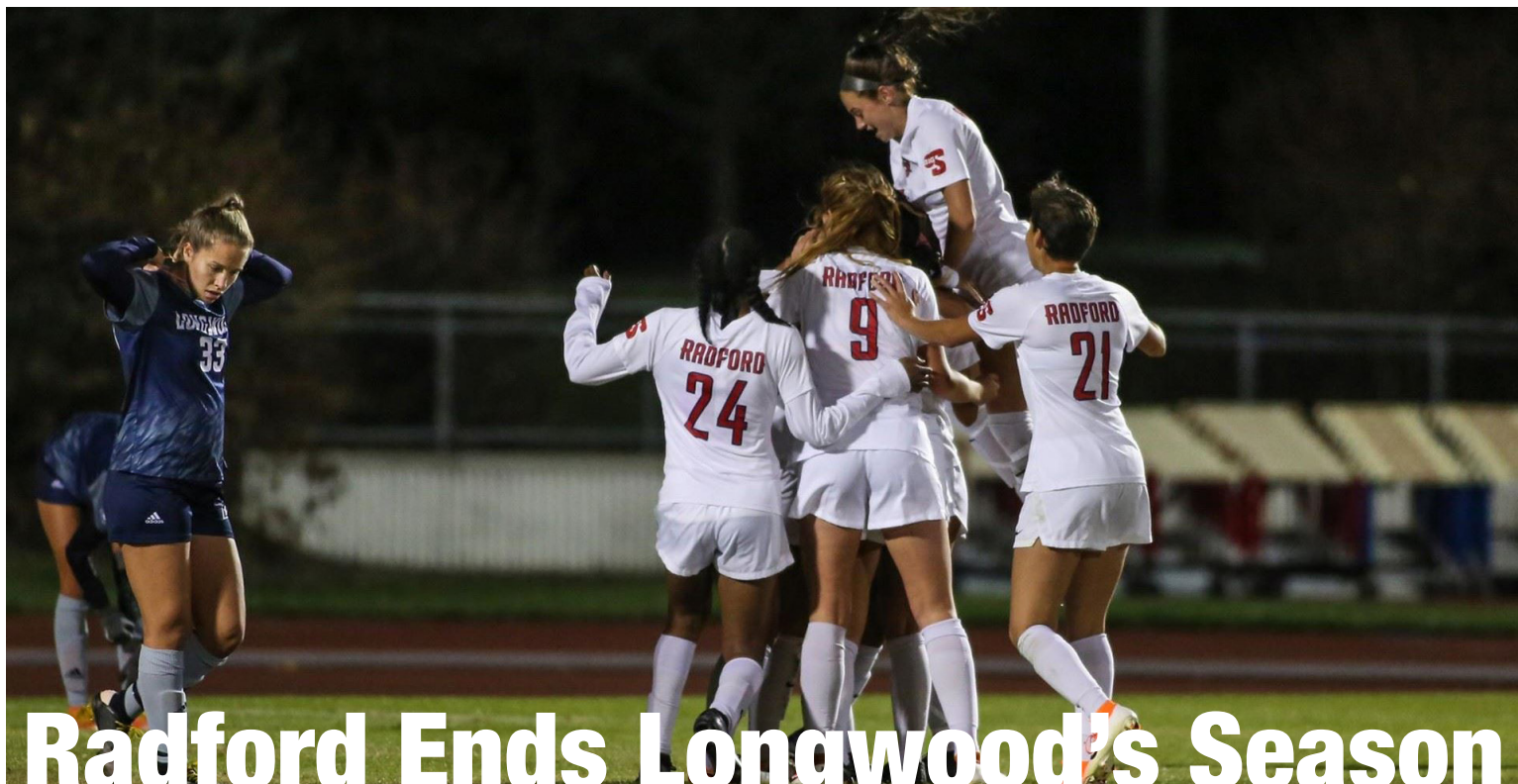

## Radford Ends Longwood's Season

Radford Women's Soccer started the postseason off with a bang last Saturday night at Cupp Stadium beating Longwood 3-2.

This game saw three different Highlanders find the back of the net and score. However, Longwood scored two second-half goals and brought the game within reach, causing much excitement.

Nelia Perez kicked off the scoring for Radford with her goal in the 11th minute of the match. The goal was assisted by Emily Dunn, who passed it to Perez, who scored the goal.

Perez would stay an attacking presence for Radford throughout their first-half shutout. She found Brianna Oliver, who took the ball, passed the defense and scored a beauty of a goal.

Radford ended the first half up 2-0. The Highlanders looked like they would cruise to victory over Longwood.

The Highlanders continued their attacking dominance with the first goal of the second half and pushed the lead to 3-0, almost seemingly out of reach for the enemy team.

Perez assisted the goal, who found team-leading scorer Gabi Paupst all alone in the center of the field. Paupst did as she always seems to do and put the ball past the keeper extending

Radford's lead.

Longwood may have been down 3-0, but they managed to score less than a minute later. They seemed to catch Radford napping, and Emilie Kupsov put the ball past Courtenay Kaplan, making the score 3-1.

Longwood's Kiersten Yuhas would add another goal in the 76th minute to minimize the defect to just one. Longwood managed to make a seemingly dominant Highlander victory forgotten as they scored two goals in under 15 minutes.

Radford was able to hold their ground despite the two goals. Kayla Thomas, Big South Defensive Player of the Year, led the defense in their efforts to stop a red-hot Longwood

Attack. Kaplan was challenged throughout the entire game and had to make her final two saves in the last ten minutes of the game.

It was for sure a wild ride for the Highlanders, who hung on for the close 3-2 win. Perez led the team with four of their twelve shots of the night. Longwood managed to outshoot the Highlanders, with 16 shots to Radford's 12.

Radford hopes to continue their winning streak as they look to face Campbell on Thursday in Matthews, North Carolina. A win in this game will allow the Highlanders to make the Big South Tournament Championship game!

## Radford Basketball Season Outlook

The Radford Men's and Women's basketball season has begun! Both teams are slated to win the Big South Conference yet again, and they start their seasons off during the first week of November.

The Men's team was picked to finish first in the Preseason Poll with redshirt junior Carlík Jones being named Big South

Preseason Player of the Year. Senior guard Travis Fields Jr. was also selected to the Big South Preseason All-Conference Second Team last week during media day.

In the 2018-2019 season, Jones averaged 15.7 points, 5.2 rebounds, and 5.8 assists per game and was an NABC District 3 First Team Selection. His assist total ranked second in the conference, and his assist/turnover ratio was 2.3 putting him at second. Also, he was

second in steals per game (1.7) and tied for fourth in field goal percentage (.463).

Jones was the Big South Freshman of the Year during the 2017-2018 season. Jones also ranks 10th in Radford program history with 294 career assists and is 89 points shy of becoming the 32nd player at Radford to record 1,000 career points. He was also second in assists on the single-season charts with 181.

Fields Jr. averaged 28.9 minutes, 10.8 points, 3.0 assists,

2.2 rebounds and 1.5 steals per game. Field's impact played an essential role in helping the Highlanders reach 22 wins last season. He broke plenty of personal records in the last season with a 33 point outing against Hampton University and posted his career-high in rebounds (8) against Longwood.

Fans will get their first regular-season look of the Highlander Men's team on

Friday, Nov. 8 against Liberty in Lynchburg.

As for the women, the Highlanders received the most first-place votes with six votes and 113 total points. Hampton University also received several

first-place votes but are netted to be the Big South runner-ups with 104 total points.

The women's team has multiple returning starters such as redshirt senior Sydney Nunley, who appeared in 29 games and started 22 of them. She averaged a near double-

double with 10.3 points and 9.5 rebounds, dominating the paint, and concluded the 2018-2019 season with 267 rebounds, 47 blocks, 28 assists, and 13 steals. Nunley recorded 12 double-doubles and joined the 500 career rebound club.

Khiana Johnson also received

an honorable mention for this upcoming season, notching a position on the Second Team All-Big South. Last season she ranked fourth in total assists at 118 and fifth in her assist to turnover ratio at 1.2. She scored in double figures in 23 games. Johnson also tallied career highs

with many different stats such as 11 points, 3.6 assists, 2.3 rebounds and a whopping 35.1 minutes a game.

The Women's team will also do some traveling this week on Friday, Nov. 8 as they take on Vanderbilt in Nashville, Tennessee.
